Jeff's Truck Set Your Sights on Memories

ay back in the early 1980s we bought a 1951 ½ ton Studebaker pickup. We restored the truck and used it as daily driver and truck, hauling loads of dirt and gravel, just as it was built for. Fast forward to the 1990s, after we moved to Wisconsin. We had the truck stored in Indiana and our son Jeff was getting close to High School graduation so we thought this truck would be a great graduation gift. I made the trip to Indiana and brought the truck back so Jeff and I could restore it.

Once we got our truck in the garage, I could see we had a lot of work ahead. Jeff was ready to go,

but winter was coming, so I talked him into waiting until spring.

As it turned out, we should have gone ahead as



Jeff wanted because we worked through the next winter anyway and still didn't get it done before the International SDC Meet in South Bend. We didn't

expect to win any awards, but hoped to enjoy the fruits of our labors behind the wheel in the place it all started.

We did a lot of work on the old truck, stripped all the paint, cut out all the rust, took off everything we could and tried to improve on a great truck design. We had to remove six or eight inches of the doors and about 12 inches in the cab corners and part of the floor. We welded up some seams and replaced more than a square foot of left front fender that was damaged.

Both front fenders were replaced with rust free fenders, and I was able to get a hood that was in good shape and only required small amounts of



cutting and welding. We had more work than we had anticipated with all the dents in the roof and the back of the cab caused by its years of service as a truck.

The bed sides also

received the cut and weld treatment to a great degree. We customized the end of the bed to close it off and shape it to fit the new bumper and give it a clean look. A friend made the tailgate. It is smooth with script to match the ones on the sides of the hood. The tailgate is held closed by two slide bolts on the inside. When open, it is held up with cables.



The bumper is the one Jeff and his buddy got at the junkyard from a '74

Malibu Classic Wagon. I felt we would not be able to make it work as it was too big and would need to be cut into five pieces. But Jeff was right again. We cut out more than 16 inches, welded up all the holes and mounted it to the frame after cutting and shaping it. The bumper looks great thanks to Jeff's imagination.



The holes in the bed for the stakes were then filled, and we made a bed cover that is black and hinged in the middle. Black carpet lines the bed and tailgate. The rear fenders were a nightmare and required a lot of welding. They should have been replaced, but we could not find any. The front bumper is a shortened '67 Camaro on cut off frame rails. We did all the metal work ourselves.

The engine had already been bored and rebuilt, so we just cleaned it up and mounted two stock carbs on a Weiand manifold. We then added a split



exhaust with dual two inch pipes and glass packs. The crackle was so loud we had to pack the three

inch by about two foot stainless tips, giving us four



glass packs. Still, it would rattle the windows in our house when Jeff pulled in.


In the future we

hope to install an electronic ignition and perhaps other speed equipment. The transmission has been changed to a five speed unit. The rear end is out of a '61 or '62 Champ. The instrument panel is custom made with seven gauges, including a 160 mph speedometer. It has the "ah-ooga" type of horn. It also has been converted to 12 volts.

Next, we painted the truck PPG Lemon Ice (bright yellow) and installed tinted glass. Jeff got some gray bucket seats from a Mercury and we installed them. Rose covered the visors and door panels in gray and black.

The truck had been attacking the streets of Janesville, Wisconsin and now Whiteland, Indiana. The Wisconsin plates proclaimed "Flat HD6". There are still some things to do, but that has not stopped Jeff from enjoying his truck.

If you see this truck running around Indiana, don't expect it to be show quality impeccable. This is an undertaking Jeff and I did as father and son. We share an interest in Studebakers, and when I bought the truck years ago Jeff was little but he still wanted to help. So it made a good father/son project. The truck was a lot more work than we expected, but we were able to give it to Jeff as a graduation gift. Jeff and Stephanie used the truck in their wedding and now that they are parents the truck will someday be their son's truck. Jeff has plans that he and Parker will redo the truck and someday it will be Parker's to enjoy.



Now when we go to car shows or see someone else's car, we can appreciate it in another way. It is not just about perfection. If you have enough money, you can have the perfect car. **But we've got the memories, and that's forever.** We can appreciate all Studebakers. There is not just one way of doing it. So, think about the work and memories that went into it and *leave the criticism to the judge.*

Today we look around and see all these nicely kept Studes, but now let's go back to 1962. My wife had just learned to drive the 61 Lark so we needed a second car. A friend of mine was being transferred so he had a car for sale.

This car was a 51 Champion that had been owned by many people including Ohio State students. It had not seen tender loving care in many years. It had a 3 speed with overdrive and on our test drive at 40mph, he stomped on the gas. The engine picked up speed, but we did not go any faster. I remember his words to this day "I guess that was not a good demonstration." I went ahead and bought it for \$50.

After driving it back and forth to work, which was 7 miles, I began to notice that every piece of the drive train had something wrong. You would go down the road at 50mph and the engine rattled, the transmission sang and the rear end wailed. I was afraid that if I fixed any one thing, it would just destroy the rest.

One day, the inner fender on the driver's side fell off. That was neat because I could watch the wear on the front tire. Another time the package shelf by the rear window decided to get up and leave. That was okay because now I could get things out the truck from inside the car.

In the winter time, you could not get the car stuck. You could pop the clutch on ice and it would come right out without spinning. I drove this car for 12 months without spending a dime except for gas and oil until one day as I pulled in front of my house the brake pedal went to the floor, happily my angel waited until then.

Obviously, the master cylinder died but I thought I better check the rest of the system. There were pin hole leaks on the lines so I thought I better look further. On pulling the front wheels, I discovered that both front brake drums had pieces missing. There were at least 3 inch gaps in the drums, but strange enough it didn't pull when you came to a stop. Since the fender rust was beginning to loosen the fenders, I thought it was time to trade. I ended up buying a 58 President, but that is a whole other story. Strange as it may seem, 3 months later I saw the 51 going down the street. Hope they fixed the brakes, because **that Champion was not about to give up.**




