### Indiana-Built Car Display at Indianapolis Motor Speedway Museum

Studebakers were well-represented at a special display of Indiana-Built cars at The Indianapolis Motor Speedway Museum this past winter. Five Studebakers were prominently displayed: A 1932/1933 Indianapolis 500 Mile Race Car, a 1940 Champion 2-door sedan, a 1951 Commander convertible, a 1962 Gran Turismo Hawk, and a 1963 Avanti. The display occupied most of the area to the west of the Museum's Grand Hall.

Indy Chapter SDCers contributed three of the cars. **Ed Reynolds** furnished his pretty, Comanche Red 1951 Commander Convertible. Kokomo Indy Chapter SDCers **Steve** & **Robbi Ortman** furnished their yellow 1962 Gran Turismo Hawk and their Avanti Turquoise 1963 Avanti. A nice 1940 Champion 2-door sedan owned by **Tom Roush** rounded out the privately-owned Studes, while **The Indianapolis Motor Speedway Museum** rolled out a 1932/1933 Studebaker Indianapolis 500 Race Car from their own collection.

Nice information cards were displayed with each car. I've included those among these photos, except for the information in front of the Ortman's Avanti. That information card included the oft-repeated nonsense that an Avanti was supposed to pace the 1962 Indianapolis 500, but a Lark

Daytona Convertible "had to be substituted at the eleventh hour because the Avanti wasn't ready." That is so wrong I'll not honor it by showing the information displayed in front of the Ortman's Avanti!



(For "the rest of the story," with documentation, you'll have to read my regular *Hemmings Classic Car* column in the upcoming December 2017 issue, tentatively entitled *Myth Busters*. Meanwhile, I've already sent the documentation to our friend **Donald Davidson**, Indianapolis Motor Speedway Historian. I wanted Donald to be able to run block the next time he hears that tired old 1962 Pace Car myth.)

Now, off my soapbox and back to the report.

While Studebakers would be expected to dominate any display of Indiana-

built cars, the display also included an 1896 Reeves Motocycle (that's not a typo; it's not *motor*cycle), a 1905 Richmond Surrey, a 1916 Inter-State (made in Muncie), a 1935 Auburn, and a pretty blue Cord, among others.

An entire room was devoted to Indiana-built cars involved in The Indianapolis 500 Mile Race. A huge floor-to-ceiling print of Studebaker's Indianapolis 500 Race Car Team, a smaller print of which most of us have seen, adorned one wall. It was near a mock-up of a



period Gasoline Alley garage, from which the museum's own 1932/1933 Studebaker race car was emerging; very cool.

Overall, this was a well-planned, well-executed display. It did Studebaker and Indiana proud and hopefully impressed many fellow Hoosiers and out-of-state Indianapolis Motor Speedway Museum visitors last winter. Thanks to Ed Reynolds, Tom Roush, and the Ortmans for representing Studebaker with their nice cars. BP

### A Special Book for Sale

I received a call from an Anne Booe from here in Irvington. She has a *Studebaker Souvenir* book from the 1893 Chicago World Fair. The following is what she wrote me:

I have for sale a 1<sup>st</sup> edition illustrated *Studebaker Souvenir* from the Studebaker Manufacturing Company published in 1893. It is a 5 x 7 soft-cover book with embossed title (raised letters are highlighted with light blue metallic ink), and is a visual history of the earliest non-motorized vehicles made between 1852 and 1893 by the company. There are 30 full page exquisite original color lithograph plates (printed in layer), with each page having an attached protective tissue sheet. Each print depicts private and commercial utility wagons, elegant carriages, buggies, coaches and phaetons. Each is portrayed with drivers and passengers in town and country vignettes. There are 47 full-page black and white renderings (including text) and one fold-out page of the main factory. Depicted are buildings, offices, departments, machine shops and shops for spring vehicles, wagons, carriage works, for steam fitting, electro-plating, steel skeins and a rattling room and charging floor foundry. There are portraits of officers. The book is completely intact and in very fine condition.




### **About Our Members**



# RED, WHITE & STUDE

July is such a patriotic month. More than any other time of the year, this is when we all turn into flag waving, parade watching, and fireworks loving people. So, this month, we start a three-part series about Studebaker's part in our military history.

The impetus for this series was born after a happenstance discovery of some little known information about the U. S. Draft procedure during WWII (at least, it was unknown to me). Did you know that in 1942 there was an "Old Man's Registration"? This was the fourth of what would eventually be six wartime registrations.

### World War II Selective Service Draft Cards:

### Fourth Registration, 1942

On April 27, 1942, the Selective Service conducted the fourth of six draft registrations. This registration, also called the "Old Man's Registration," collected information on the industrial capacity and skills of men born between April 27, 1877, and February 16, 1897 (ages 45 to 64). This draft registration was not intended to be used for military service, but to provide a complete inventory of manpower resources in the United States that could be used for national service.

Draft Card Content: The Fourth Registration Draft cards contain the following information: ☐ the registrant's serial number ☐ the registrant's name ☐ his residence, mailing address, and telephone number ☐ date and place of birth ☐ the name and address of his employer ☐ the registrant's height, weight, race, hair color, eye color, distinguishing marks ☐ the registrant's signature ☐ the name and address of a person who would always know the registrant's address.

It's a pretty good bet that there were a great many Studebaker workers included in that Fourth Registration. Maybe they were too old to serve on the front lines, but they were definitely experienced and dedicated enough to turn out planes, trucks, tanks and engines.
