
- September is the National Drags.

Devoted SDCers and Indianapolis 500 enthusiasts will want to acquire a copy of the October 2019 *Collectible Automobile* (Volume 36, Number 3), now on newsstands. In that issue is an interesting, 12-page article, authored by noted SDC Historian **Dick Quinn**, entitled; *An Exacting Test: Studebakers at Indianapolis in the Thirties*. The article goes into incredible detail about Studebaker's factory teams and others who ran Studebaker President straight-eight engines between 1927 and 1933 at The Indianapolis Motor Speedway.

This is undoubtedly the most detailed and accurate report of that phase of Studebaker history that will ever be published. Seven color (or colorized) photos and 24 black & white photos enhance the text. The text was proof-read by Indianapolis Motor Speedway Historian **Donald Davidson**. Donald recommended only two minor changes; changes made before the issue went to press.

One of the subject Studebaker race cars, the Green #37, was the recent topic of discussion when it was consigned to the 2019 Gooding Collector-Car Auction that was part of Monterey Car

Week during August 2019 at The Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance. The Studebaker National Museum hoped to acquire the car and solicited pledges from SDC members through the SDC Internet Forum to augment the amount the museum board felt it could pay for the car. Pledges totaled \$120,000. Ultimately, the pledges and museum funds allotted were not enough to better the high bid of exactly **\$1,000,000**; what the car sold for on Saturday, August 17, while SDC Indy Chapter members were lunching and meeting at Bubba's 33 Grille in Greenwood.

Including the Buyer's Premium, the total tendered for the car was **\$1,105,000**. It is certain that the figure represents the highest price ever paid for a Studebaker motor vehicle. Hopefully, the new owner (whose identity is yet to be disclosed as I write this) will loan it to The Studebaker National Museum at some time, or perhaps display it at A Studebaker Drivers Club meet.

As a bonus, this issue of *Collectible Automobile* also contains a lengthy interview of Studebaker's last Director of Advertising and Public Relations in Hamilton, Ontario; **Stu Chapman**. Stu's *Personality Profile* is well-written by historian Patrick Foster. The four-page interview includes 12 photographs, half of them in color.

Collectible Automobile is a bimonthly publication. This October issue may be considered the current issue and is now available on newsstands. It will likely remain on newsstands through September, but it's a good idea to buy one when and where you can find it, because single-issue copies are not widely distributed. (I bought mine at the *Barnes & Noble* near Carmel's Clay Terrace shopping center in a strip mall known as Greyhound Plaza, just above 146th Street off U.S. 31 North.)
