Hendricks County

Local Collector Car Invited To Annual Festival of Machines

Hendricks County collector-car enthusiast Tom Lawlis of Plainfield has been invited to display his 1957 Stude-baker Golden Hawk 400 at Conner Prairie's Sixth Annual Festival of Machines celebration in Noblesville September 14 and 15.

The Festival of Machines selection committee visited central Indiana car shows all summer and considered about 1,700 cars and trucks at those shows. Of the 1,700, only 40 were asked to participate in the 2019 Festival of Machines. One show the selection committee visited was Hendricks County's Cruisin' in Coatesville Car Show and Street Fair July 20. There, the committee members inspected Tom's Golden Hawk and invited him to participate in this year's Festival of Machines. Tom has accepted the invitation and the car will be displayed at the event.

In addition to high-quality vintage cars at the Festival of Machines, there will be displays of tractors, fire trucks, large-scale construction equipment, and military vehicles. Family-friendly activities will allow guests of all ages to explore vehicle technology in fun and interactive ways. The event is open to the public 10:00 AM - 5 PM both days.

Of 4,356 1957 Studebaker Golden Hawks manufactured, only 51 were special Golden Hawk 400s, distinguished by unique leather interiors and two-tone paint treatments on those ordered with two-tone paint. Tom's 400, however, was one of 15 monotone Golden Hawk 400s and was restored in its original color, Inca Cream, a soft, non-metallic vellow.

The Golden Hawk 400 has been in the Lawlis family since June 1960, when Tom's late older brother Jerry bought the car off a gas station lot on Indianapolis' west side. The car was all but used up by both Jerry and Tom as they drove it year-'round to Purdue and, later, when Jerry attended law school in Ann Arbor MI. Well-worn and rusty, the car was taken off the road when the odometer registered 99,839 for the second time.

A thorough restoration was in order, for which Tom began accumulating parts decades ago. His 20-year restoration was completed in 2017. The car has won numerous local awards in the two years it has been shown extensively in Hendricks and surrounding counties.

I went for a walk in the woods one day


To talk to myself, that's sometimes my way.
