Spring Maintenance Reminders

1. Check the underneath side of your car for any leaks, such as brake fluid, oil (that can be engine oil, transmission oil or rear end oil), gas leaking or antifreeze. This includes heater core, heater hose, and radiator for leaks. If any of the hoses or belts appears to be cracked or dried out, replace them. That's better than having them break while you are driving somewhere.

2. If you haven't done this since last year, change your engine oil, filter and grease your car.

3. Make sure you have the proper level of transmission oil, rear end oil and brake fluid in the master cylinder. The radiator should have the proper level and the right mixture of antifreeze to protect against freezing and boiling over.

4. Brake systems accumulate moisture over a period of time. If they haven't been bled in the last few years, it will eventually cause rust in your master and wheel cylinders.

5. One other thing that is often over looked is your tires. Even if they look ok and are over 10 years old, you should consider replacing them.

6. Don't forget to replace your windshield wipers. A clear windshield makes driving in bad weather safer.



It was the third day of the Studebaker International Meet; Lark Parker sat in the straight-back hotel chair waiting the Avanti parts demonstration for to begin. He didn't have an Avanti, but he hoped the others at the sub-floor box installation seminar would assume he did. In fact, he had driven there in his 1958 Scotsman station wagon but no one seemed interested in discussing it with him.

Lark noticed how much the sub-floor boxes (the speaker called them hog troughs) looked like fuel tanks and he wondered whether they could be modified to hold liquid. The old time moonshine runners could really have used those tanks to carry corn liquor. His attention wandered.....

.....Deep in Harlan County Kentucky the 39 Champion coupe pitched and swayed up the old logging path. The modified trough tanks were full of the finest dew produced in the state. Parker was starting his Lark last moonshine delivery. As he pulled onto the blacktop the alcohol injected Avanti engine smoothed to a steady throb. He felt secure with the power waiting under his foot, knowing it could handle any of the Fed's government issued cars.

What Lark didn't know was that the Feds had seized Junior Johnson's high powered Pontiac. The car had been transported to Harlan County for the sole purpose of chasing him down.

The Lark Parker legend had become to large for the Feds to tolerate and they were determined to arrest this backwoods businessman.


