Aunt Bee's Last Studebaker

Thanks to owners Brad and Christine Born, Danville has an unusual fondness for all things related to The Andy Griffith Show and its fictitious town of Mayberry. Since 1989, generations of Danville residents have enjoyed

dining among Andy Griffith Show memorabilia while watching reruns of the show at the Born's Mayberry Café on Danville's town square.

Did you know that actress Frances Bavier, who played the famous Aunt Bee on The Andy Griffith show, was a regular Studebaker customer? Indeed she was.

Ms. Bavier passed away December 6, 1989 at her home in Siler City, North Carolina. At the time of her death, she still owned the last new Studebaker she ever bought, a



1966 Studebaker Daytona 2-door sedan. Although it had deteriorated somewhat from not being driven as they both aged, the car exists today, having been purchased from her estate in 1990 by a Studebaker enthusiast.

"Aunt Bee's" 1966 Studebaker was a six-cylinder 1966 Daytona Sports Sedan, identified as model 66S-F8 on this Retail Sale Card from The Studebaker National Museum. At the time, vehicles did not have what we now

know as Vehicle Identification Numbers (VINs). Rather, they had simple Serial Numbers. Note that Ms. Bavier's car carried Serial Number C131698.

The car's Production Order indicates it was Algonquin Green with a Black Vinyl Top, identical to the 1966 Daytona Sports Sedan shown in the 1966 Studebaker brochure shown here. Her car, however, had a black vinyl interior, rather than the white vinyl interior in the brochure car.


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Ms. Bavier's 1966 Daytona was built October 18, 1965, but records indicate it remained unsold and in stock at Johnson Motor Sales in Santa Barbara, California when Studebaker discontinued automobile production on March 17, 1966. (South Bend, Indiana, Studebaker production ended on December 31, 1963. All 1965 and 1966 Studebakers were assembled in Hamilton, Ontario, Canada.)

The Retail Sale Card indicates she bought the car from the largest Studebaker dealer on the west coast, Frost & French in Los Angeles. Unsubstantiated rumor has it that Frost & French went up and down the west coast buying leftover new Studebakers from smaller, marginal dealers after production ceased in Hamilton. The principals at Frost & French (including then-owner W. L. Bibens, who sold Ms. Bavier her Daytona) must have thought they had a good customer base who would want to buy one last new Studebaker now that new ones would no longer be available.

Frances Bavier was one of those customers. She didn't buy her new Daytona until June 14, 1966, almost 3 months after the last Studebaker had been built. She knew Studebaker was out of business. In fact, in a November 6, 1972 letter to Studebaker Drivers Club member K. Victor Smith of Winston-Salem, N.C, she

testified, "I've driven Studebakers for 40 years -all kinds, all models- and no other car. Watching the



pictures of the closing of the factory, I did indeed weep!" It is known that she was driving a 1962 Studebaker Lark at the time, so she may have wanted to replace it, although she apparently did not trade it in.

Ms. Bavier, as Aunt Bee, may be seen driving her 1966 Studebaker Daytona in at least one Mayberry R.F.D. episode. The episode entitled *The Mynah Bird* has extensive footage of her in the car...and since it is in color, the car's colors are apparent.

Thanks are extended to my good friend and authority on all things Andy Griffith and The Andy Griffith Show, Bill Pressler of Kent OH, for bringing this material to my attention.

Bill was in Indianapolis for the Studebaker Drivers Club International Meet in September 2021. During the week, my

wife and I took Bill and five additional out-of-state Studebaker friends to Danville's Mayberry Café for dinner one night. We called ahead to tell them we had a late party of eight coming, so they were prepared. Our party thoroughly enjoyed the meal and Mayberry atmosphere and were still conversing at closing time; an enjoyable experience for all. They still talk about it; the wait staff was so friendly and accommodating. Good PR for Danville and Hendricks County.

Frances Bavier's gravestone reads, "*To live in the hearts of those left behind is not to die.*" Indeed....and regarding Aunt Bee's preferred automobiles, as the late Paul Harvey would say; "*Now you know the rest of the story.*"

As you can see on page 1, the *Brickyard Bulletin* is on its 49th volume, making next year it's "golden" anniversary. I don't know how long the club had been established before the *Brickyard*, that's something that needs investigated. In celebration of our 50th plans are being made for special editions/articles in 2023. I'll keep you up to date on our progress and may need assistance from members.

Studebaker Jeins with Police

It was late on Saturday morning, June 30, 1934. The Merchants National Bank, on Michigan Street, in downtown South Bend would soon be closing for the day. The bank tellers were starting to organize their cash drawers and praying the accounts would balance quickly so they could head home and enjoy the rest of the lovely summer day.

Suddenly, the heavily armed John Dillinger gang burst into the bank. Chaos ensued as the gang members shouted orders to the trembling tellers. Someone triggered the silent alarm and police officers were waiting outside when the gang made their exit from the bank. Police officer Howard Wagner was killed as he approached the fleeing gangsters. The scene quickly turned into a shootout between two police officers, a detective, a bank customer and Dillinger's boys.



Amid the flying bullets, the criminals made their getaway with the police in hot pursuit. Several witnesses remembered seeing the gang's black Hudson car pulling away from the pursuing police as the cops and robbers went racing out Washington Street. It was obvious that the South Bend Police Department was outgunned and outrun during their efforts to stop the robbery and catch the thieves. In response, the always public-minded Studebaker Company customized a 1934 President for the struggling hometown police department.

The car that Studebaker provided boasted a powerful motor, a gun porthole in the windshield, and armored baffles to protect the radiator and tires. Although the police were now equipped to fight fire with fire, the "Dillinger Car" was never actually used for criminal pursuit. Sadly, a few years later, the South Bend Police Department's answer to John Dillinger and other criminals was demolished in a wreck.

The unique customized car may have been wrecked, but soon other police departments developed armored police cars similar to the famous Studebaker Dillinger car. Canton, Ohio modified a 1937 Studebaker President with many of the same features, but they added armor plating around the car body and 1-1/8 inch thick bullet-proof glass. Six portholes were mounted in the glass...two on each side, one on the front, and one in the rear.

Even the tire tubes resisted punctures from gunfire. The doors of the car are so heavy that an extra hinge had to be added. These modifications increased the weight of the car by almost a ton (for a total weight of 2.5 tons) and put a final price tag of \$5,400 on a car that retailed for about \$1,200.

The special armored Studebaker was ordered by the city of Canton in 1937 to maintain control at the violent steel strikes at area mills. But fast forward to 1957. Three desperate robbers wounded a Louisville policeman and then took a family hostage northeast of Canton, while hiding in their home. When the police discovered the hiding place, they used the 20-year old armored car to drive through a hail of bullets to a point near the home.



They then were able to launch tear gas bombs into the basement. Moments later, with screams of pain and watering eyes, the bandits surrendered!
