All About Tires

Are your tires tired? It is a scientific fact that after 7 years of age the rubber compounds that make up tires become brittle and deteriorates very quickly. At 10 years from date of manufacture tires are considered to be unsafe.

When we look at our collector car tires we usually see very little tread wear due to our driving limited miles over the course of a year. Contrast this to our daily driver cars and we normally see that tires on a daily driver usually do not even last 10 years as they are worn out tread wise in less than 70,000 miles.

If you choose to drive on old tires you are taking a chance of blowout. This severe action usually results in a bad situation and often the vehicle careens off the road. A bad thing.

How do we check the age of our tires? This is relatively easy since the tires are stamped with a date code on the sidewall. There are a string of numbers and letters on the sidewall but we are interested only in the last four digits which spell out the week and year of manufacture. i.e. 2616 means the tire was made in the 26th week of 2016.

After you read this article I hope that you go out to the garage and check your sidewall for the date codes of your tires and if necessary consider buying new tires prior to taking your car out on the road again. While you are at it you may want to check the tire pressure. New cars have the pressure indicated on a sticker on the door jamb of the vehicle but our older cars leave that up to the owner to determine. My recommendations for bias ply tires are to run them at 28lbs front and back. If you have converted to radial tires (a good idea) you should probably run them with 32lbs pressure. Check them before you set out on any road trip.

While we are on the subject of tires it is a good time to speak about tire balancing. All tires should be balanced when installed on a rim. If you get a vibration usually felt in the steering wheel at 65mph it is a sign of a tire out of balance. Besides the shaking which does not do anything good for your suspension, it normally begins the process of "cupping" or making flat spots on your tire, if left untreated. If left for a long time in an unbalanced state the tire will be rendered useless.

Tires are the only contact that your car has with the road. That small patch of rubber is all that separates you from serious accidents. Inspect your tires for cracks especially near the rim where the sidewall contacts the rim. This is usually the first place that tires start to deteriorate and cracks appear.

I know that Studebaker people are often referred to as "cheap" but when it comes to your tires do not take a chance on them for the sake of saving a few dollars.

Meet Garrett Morgan

Meet Garrett Morgan, inventor of the 3-tiered traffic light. He was born in Paris, Kentucky, on March 4, 1877, Garrett Morgan was the seventh of 11 children. Landing his first job as a handyman and then repairing sewing machines, Morgan developed the skills necessary to open his own repair shop in 1907. Morgan quickly became one of the nation's top inventors. He patented several inventions, including an improved sewing machine and traffic signal, plus a respiratory device that would later provide the blueprint for WWI gas masks. In 1914, Morgan patented the breathing device, or "safety hood," providing its wearers with a safer breathing experience in the presence of smoke, gases and other pollutants. Morgan worked hard to market the device, especially to fire departments, often personally demonstrating its reliability in fires. Morgan's breathing device became the prototype and precursor for the gas masks used during World War I, protecting soldiers from toxic gas used in warfare. The invention earned him the first prize at the Second International Exposition of Safety and Sanitation in New York City.

In 1916, the city of Cleveland was drilling a new tunnel under Lake Erie for a fresh water supply. Workers hit a pocket of natural gas, which resulted in a huge explosion and trapped workers underground amidst suffocating noxious fumes and dust. When Morgan heard about the explosion, he and his brother put on breathing devices, made their way to the tunnel and entered as quickly as possible. The brothers managed to save two lives and recover four bodies before the rescue effort was shut down.

After he earned enough to purchase his own car. Morgan noticed that the manually operated traffic lights were ineffective as they would switch from "Stop" to "Go" with no warning. This led to Morgan's idea for an interim warning position—what would become today's yellow light. The signal Morgan patented was a T-shaped pole with three settings. Morgan quickly acquired patents for his traffic signal—a rudimentary version of the modern three-way traffic light—in the United States, Britain and Canada, he would later sell the rights to his invention to General Electric for \$40,000.

Morgan began developing glaucoma in 1943 and lost most of his sight as a result. The accomplished inventor died in Cleveland, Ohio, on July 27, 1963.

Duane Miller, Iowa Hawkeye Chapter, SDC Not long after the Wright brothers flew the first successful airplane, people started wondering...could we make a car fly, too? Over the years, many attempts were made to achieve this goal. Some were better than others, but from the early 20th Century until today, we have not created a flying

car that is both practical and financially feasible. Even in 2022, we still are not enjoying traveling around in one of George Jetson's flying automobiles! But wait! Back up a bit. Let's take a trip back in time to 1937 and see how Studebaker was involved in the creation of a real working...flying...driving vehicle. Take a gander at the **Studebaker powered** Arrowbile?

Waldo Dean Waterman (1894-1976) was an inventor and aviation pioneer in California. In 1937, he built five

Waterman Arrowbiles. They were high-wing monoplanes with detachable wings, a propeller attached to the rear of the vehicle, and a 3-



wheeled car that was powered by a **Studebaker 100-horsepower engine**. For road use, the wings and propeller could be quickly detached. On the ground, the engine drove the main wheels through a differential gear, and the car was steered by its nosewheel. Initially wheels were enclosed in fairings as a road safety measure. So, instead of removing the propeller for the road, it could be de-clutched to prevent it from windmilling the engine at speed.

Five Arrowbiles were built. On February 21, 1937 three attempted a flight from Santa Monica to the National Air Races venue in Cleveland. Ohio (a circle distance of about 2,060 miles. One Arrowbile was forced to land in Arizona, but the other two reached the races and gave demonstration flights. *The picture above right shows one of these vehicles that is on display in the*



Smithsonian Air and Space Museum extension in Dulles, Virginia.

The wheel in the two-seat cabin controlled the Arrowbile both on



the road and in the air. The cabin interior was designed to match current motor car standards. It featured easy access and a baggage space under the seats.

However, there was very little market response and Waterman struggled with a lack of funding. Sadly, he was forced to cease production of the Arrowbile in 1938.
