

Just a quick follow up to the Article about tires by Peter Sant in the September Brickyard. There are a lot of numbers on tires so to simplify the task look for the letters "DOT" followed by a bunch of numbers. The last 4 digits should be the date code he refers to. Tires made before 2000 more than likely will not have the DOT date code. Which means they should be replaced or at least know you are taking a risk. Also if a tire is 6 years or older a tire shop may refuse to repair any leak it may have regardless of where the leak is.

How to Read the Tire Date Code?

DOT M64B IC1R 3317



Look at the sidewall of your tire – there will be a code following the letters "DOT" – for Department of Transportation, There will be up to 13 characters that give you the information you need to identify your tire and also identify the date of manufacture of your tires,

7-12 Character TIN

- The first two characters will be a code that represents the assigned plant code for the manufacturer.
- The next one to two characters represent the tire size code.
- The next grouping can be no more than four characters that are designated by the manufacturer with their internal codes for the specific construction of that tire. Because these characters are optional for the manufacturer, the TIN can be any length up to a maximum of twelve characters.
- The final four digits, for any tire made since the year 2000, are the tire date code and
 represent the date of manufacture. The first two of these digits designates the week of the
 year the tires were made, and the final two digits are the last two digits of the year of
 manufacture. (For example, 1319 means the thirteenth week of 2019.)

COAL POWERED STUDEBAKER MILITARY TRUCK

Steven Schultheis relates that his Grandfather, C.M. Schultheis, was an automotive engineer with Studebaker in the 1940's and 1950's. One of his projects was a coal powered 6X6 truck for the U.S. Army. The truck was used along the Alaskan Highway in the mid to late 1940's. This picture was taken in South Bend in 1945. Steven indicates that the truck runs on coal, but he does not know if it has a steam engine, or if it uses a gasification process. Does anyone have additional information about this unusual truck?



An e-mail from Bill Skizik <u>SKIZIK777@Aol.com</u> indicates that the truck was not steam powered. Rather, it used coal gas as fuel for the engine. Bituminous coal was roasted in a chamber, and then the gasses were extracted into the engine.

A HISTORICAL TIDBIT - THE PATEE HOUSE

4 852, the year the Studebaker blacksmith shop opened in South Bend, is an important year for all of us

Studebaker aficionados. Another important date to think about is 1858, the year that the Patee House opened in St. Joseph, Missouri. The Patee House should be of interest to Americans because it was the starting point of the Pony Express that carried mail by horseback to Sacramento, California. Admittedly, it did not last long due to the telegraph. It is, however, a very colorful time in our history.

So, what does this have to do with Studebaker? The
Studebakers established a St. Joe wagon yard in 1865, as the
Civil War was winding down. The new repository was established by Peter, one of the five Studebaker brothers. By 1877
the Studebakers were well established in St. Joe. In that year
on June 27th, Peter's son Wilbur married Fannie Dulin, age 16
and a junior at St. Joseph Female College. Attending the wedding were Peter's four brothers. The next day the new bride and
the Studebaker family left for Chicago and South Bend aboard the "President", a special railroad car.

The Patee House is a great museum, displaying Americana in ways that take you back to the days-of-old. It is well worth a stop if you are traveling across America. There is easy access off I-35 or I-29, and with the Studebaker connection, including a 1927 Commander, it is a must see for us aficionados.

Author's notes: I chose this view of the '27 Commander from the Patee House Museum because of the Maid-Rite hamburger sign, which started in 1926 the same year as Route 66.

Anyone growing up in the Midwest knows how tasty these crumbled and steamed hamburger sandwiches are. The photo above is the Patee House that displays its 1858 architecture. St. Joe is a very old city that has many buildings that are worth seeing.

Studebaker HAUNTINGS

We've all heard about haunted houses. We've read books, seen movies, and heard people relate stories about various buildings and houses that were haunted as in...to inhabit, visit, or appear in the form of a ghost or other supernatural being. So the question this month is: Do you believe that Tippecanoe Place could be haunted?

Most everyone is familiar with the history of Tippecanoe Place. Clement Studebaker's mansion was completed in February 1889. Unfortunately (or perhaps mystically) the interior of the structure was gutted by fire and had to rebuilt. The Studebaker family finally moved into the 26,000 square-foot home a year later. Final cost (including the rebuild of the fire damaged interior and the furnishings) totaled \$450,000. Clem and Anna had three children: George, Anne, and Clem, Jr. They were already adults when Tippecanoe Place was competed.

Clem died in 1901 and his wife in 1916. George Studebaker took possession of the mansion and lived there with his wife Ada until 1933, when they were forced to declare bankruptcy and sell their lavish home. It stood abandoned until a South Bend businessman bought it for \$20,000 in 1941 and donated it to be used as the E.M. Morris School for Crippled Children. This facility was in operation from 1947 to 1970. In 1979, after a \$2 million restoration that included retention of the OLDEST working elevator in Indiana, the mansion was converted to the restaurant we know and enjoy today. It was around this time that people started seeing...feeling...and reporting strange things at Tippecanoe Place.

Reported Sightings and Hauntings

Since 1980, patrons and staff alike have reportedly encountered a mysterious woman in white. One

of the original restaurant managers had a dramatic encounter with a ghostly woman who passed through him on her way into the George and Ada suite. In the early 1990s, a hostess was closing up for the night and ran into the same woman as she descended the staircase. The specter's image faded away just below her knees. Others have reportedly seen the ghost of a maid named Beatrice and have heard loud noises coming from the attic.

Tippecanoe Place's House Historian, Doug Graczyk says, "Everybody who works here has experienced something. People tell me of hearing voices, seeing shadows and balls of light, and even pictures swinging on the walls. There is actually an infamous photo featuring a soldier standing at the bar. But, spookily, the man wasn't there when the photograph was taken."

Now, after you have read the history of the mansion along with all the reported "evidence", let's revisit the original question at the beginning of this October article. Do you believe that Tippecanoe Place could be haunted?




