Tech Tip From Rock Auto

Is that prized car tucked away for the winter? The oil changed. Fuel stabilizer elixir added to the gas tank. The car up on jack stands. Each spark plug removed, and a little oil sprayed into the cylinders. A trickle charger attached to the battery. A car cover carefully fitted. The garage alarm system activated. Time to put on the slippers and curl up by the fireplace. Wrong! It is time to panic! As I learned last week that car is at risk!

The season for storing classic cars is also the season when millions of vermin look for a safe, snuggly winter home. My 1992 Dodge van is not (yet) a classic. I did not even put it away for the winter. I happily drove it on Sunday and on Tuesday I discovered the check-engine light was on and a rough running motor. When I pulled off the engine cover, I found evidence a rat had decided to bring a few tree leaves and move in next to a valve cover. Was he watching with bags packed when I backed the van into the carport on Sunday?

Rat (and mouse) incisor teeth grow continuously. They gnaw on things to keep those teeth from getting too long and probably just to pass the time. My rat gnawed the wires off one of the van's fuel injectors. In less than 48 hours, a rat disabled the Dodge. I believe my Studebaker addiction started early in life. I don't remember much about the early part. Dad became a Studebaker employee at the South Bend Studebaker plant during 1939. By 1943 and working at Studebakers during the war effort, he had heard of a fellow employee that had a 1942 Skyway for sale. When he made the purchase of this 1942 Skyway this was the first Studebaker that he had ever owned. Me at the age of five was very impressed with this big car, especially the large back seat and fender skirts. There were many family trips made in this amazing automobile. Many memories still remain with me.

During the late 40's, there were many functions that took place at the Studebaker union hall - union meetings, Saturday night bingo, etc. Of course parents brought their children with them and these were great times that have left memories of these years for my brother and I. My uncle, Bill Ogden, was quite involved with the Studebaker union. Between him and my Dad, I was able to attend many functions. Studebaker as a company held many functions thru the years for



Studebaker employees. At Christmas time there were always some type of entertainment and gifts for all the kids. These functions were held at various locations around South Bend, John Adams High School, Notre Dame Stadium, and naturally the Studebaker union hall. Studebaker as a company was all about cars, but at the same time, it was a very employee friendly company. (This is another reason why Studebaker.)



much like the one my Dad had purchased new - no radio, no fender skirts, and a small back seat, somehow my opinion changed about Studebaker Champions. My '47 had a few things that my Dad's didn't. Paint chips, dents, and a very weak front spring, but I was very happy with it at the time.

Along came a 1951 Commander 2 door sedan. At the same time I gained a girl friend named Berniece. A lot of miles were put on this car, many in a DRAG RACING mode. Then there was a 1953 Commander Starliner to replace the '51, but Berniece was still with me. During 1947 my dad decided that the fantastic 42 Skyway had to go, and he ordered a new 1947 Champion. Of course he got his company discount. This Champion was a small 4 door, no radio. no fender skirts, and a very small back seat. I never understood as a kid why he would get rid of the Skyway for a Champion. 1948 brought a new Land Cruiser and 1950 another new Champion, which was his last Studebaker. After this, he started purchasing Brand X automobiles (Dodge).

Turning 16 in 1954, took my driver's test asap (passed). A short time after, I purchased my first Studebaker at Freeman/Spicer Studebaker dealership in South Bend. Guess what? A 1947 Studebaker Champion, very

Although the Studebaker Corp. has been gone for many years, Studebakers and the memories of the 1950's in South Bend will always remain a big part of our lives.

HO! HO! HO! and MERRY CHRISTMAS!


Upcoming Events
